Dear Attorney General Formella:

We represent DePauw University (hereinafter “DePauw”) located in Greencastle, Indiana, with respect to a data security incident described in more detail below. DePauw takes the security and privacy of the information in its control seriously, and has taken steps to prevent a similar incident from occurring in the future.

This letter will serve to inform you of the nature of the security breach, the number of New Hampshire residents being notified, what information has been compromised, and the steps that DePauw is taking to restore the integrity of the system. We have also enclosed hereto a sample of the notification made to the potentially impacted individuals, which includes an offer of free credit monitoring.

1. Nature of the Security Incident

On October 31, 2023, DePauw was the target of a cybersecurity incident. An unauthorized third party attempted to infiltrate DePauw’s computer systems. This incident may have resulted in the exposure of personal information that was located on DePauw’s systems, including

. This information was maintained for standard enrollment, administrative, and payroll functions.

DePauw is not aware of any evidence that information has been misused and has not received any reports of related identity theft since the date of the incident.

2. Number of New Hampshire Residents Affected

A total of ten (10) residents of New Hampshire were potentially affected by this security incident. Notification letters to these individuals were mailed on November 22, 2023 by first class mail including an offer of free credit monitoring. Sample copies of the notifications are included with this letter.

3. Steps Taken

Upon learning of this incident, DePauw moved quickly to institute a response plan, which included conducting an investigation with the assistance of third-party forensic specialists and engaging in steps to confirm the security of relevant systems. DePauw is also reviewing its safeguards relating to the security of its systems and servers.



The vast majority of employee information is securely maintained through ADP, a third party cloud solution, and was not impacted. However, an internal file server that housed some information related to employee benefits was potentially impacted. While we found no evidence that your information has been specifically misused, it is possible that the following personal information could have been accessed by an unauthorized third party:
