Re: Notification of Potential Information Security Breach

Dear Sir or Madam:

We represent Inovis of Alpharetta, Georgia ("Inovis").

In accordance with N.H. Rev. Stat. Ann. § 359-C:20(i)(b), I am writing to inform you about a potential security breach regarding personal information held by Inovis. Based on Inovis's investigation to date, it has determined that a laptop in the possession of an employee of GXS (a company that is currently in the process of merging with Inovis) was stolen on or about May 4, 2010, and GXS notified Inovis on May 21, 2010. The laptop contained databases including personal information regarding approximately 2 New Hampshire residents. The data included the name and social security number of existing employees of Inovis.

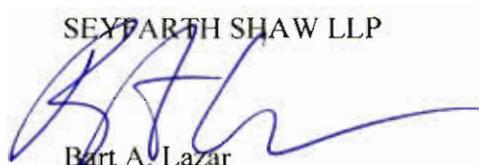
Inovis takes privacy and security matters very seriously. Upon learning of the incident, Inovis initiated an investigation, conducted an investigation and required GXS to conduct an investigation of the matter.

Inovis sent an email communication to its employees and also had the attached notice sent. The notice describes, among other things: (1) the general nature of the incident; (2) the type of personal information that was the subject of the possible security breach; (3) steps that Inovis has taken to prevent further misuse of the data; (4) steps the employees can take to protect themselves against identity theft; (5) contact information for inquiries; and (6) information regarding identity theft protection that Inovis has procured on behalf of its employees.

Dear Inovis Employees,

At Inovis, we care about the privacy and security of our employee data. As you know, we have been engaged in completing a merger with GXS, and as part of that merger we have provided certain information regarding Inovis to GXS. We were notified on Friday May 21, 2010 that a GXS employee's laptop was stolen which contained Inovis U.S. employee personal information. Our investigation indicates that the information includes names, addresses, SSNs, and salary data. We have procedures in place at Inovis that would have prevented such an event, but we are reviewing our procedures to ensure they are still viable and sufficient. We have also received assurances from GXS that they are taking action to ensure that a similar incident does not occur in the future. This matter has been reported to law enforcement by GXS and an investigation is pending.

Based on our investigation to date, we are unaware of any misuse of the information that may have been wrongfully and unlawfully obtained. In addition, based on the investigation so far, we believe that the likelihood of improper use of this data is low. Nevertheless, in an abundance of caution, we encourage you to be proactive to help avoid the breach of your identity. You should review the following information on steps you should take immediately. In addition, you should review the document titled "What you should know" at the web address (http://sharepoint/Departments/HR/Benefits/Documents/What%20you%20should%20know_doc.pdf), as this contains resource information and contact numbers that might be helpful to you in preventing Identity Fraud from occurring.

Steps to take

1.) You are encouraged to place a 90 day "fraud alert" with the credit bureaus right away. Only one credit bureau needs to be contacted and it will automatically alert the other two. Once the fraud alert has been placed, you will receive written confirmation from each of the credit bureaus separately by mail within 7 to 10 days. There will be a reference #, which can be used to call the credit bureaus and request a free credit report.

The above are automated lines and will request your social security number as well as a daytime and evening time phone number.

2.) You are also encouraged to review your credit report in a few days just to make sure that things look okay and there isn't any suspicious information. You may order a free credit report online at: www.annualcreditreport.com. This report will not include credit scores.

3.) Finally, you are reminded that Inovis provides Identity Theft coverage for you and should you have any further questions or require any assistance, please feel free to contact them at (800) 842-8496, option #2. Under this policy - provided at no expense to you by Inovis - you may receive guidance by a consumer fraud specialist and reimbursement of expenses up to \$25,000 for attorney fees, notary and certified mail charges, and lost wages up to \$500 per week.

We apologize for any inconvenience this may have caused. We are also available if you require any additional information or have questions.
