Dear Sirs or Madams:

I write on behalf of my client, Lime Crime, Inc. (operator of the limecrime.com website; the "Website"), in supplement to Lime Crime's February 24, 2015 submission to your office regarding a security incident involving the Website (the "Original Submission," attached for your reference). As provided in the Original Submission, Lime Crime experienced a security incident involving personal information provided to Lime Crime that affected New Hampshire residents. Upon further investigation, Lime Crime has identified another 9 New Hampshire residents that were potentially affected by the incident, in addition to those mentioned in the Original Submission, bringing the total number of affected New Hampshire residents to approximately 189. Lime Crime has notified these additional 9 individuals and has outlined some steps they may take to help protect themselves.

The additional 9 affected individuals have been notified via written letter dated March 6, 2015, which includes an offer for one year of complimentary identity protection and fraud resolution services. Form copies of the notices sent to the 9 additional New Hampshire residents are included for your reference.

On February 11, 2015, after an extensive forensic investigation, we learned that on October 4, 2014 unauthorized individuals installed malicious software on the computer server hosting the Website. We believe the malware could have compromised the personal information of customers that made, or attempted to make, credit or debit card purchases through the Website between October 4, 2014 and February 15, 2015, including name, address, website username and password, payment card account number, card expiration date, and payment card security code. According to our records, you made, or attempted to make, a payment card purchase at the Website during that timeframe and your information may be at risk.

Lime Crime takes the privacy of personal information seriously, and deeply regrets that this incident occurred. We have taken steps to address this incident including temporarily taking the Website offline to prevent any further theft of personal information. In addition, we replaced the e-commerce platform we previously used with a new platform, which has undergone a security vulnerability scan and code review and is further certified as PCI compliant. As of now, the incident has been contained and eliminated.

We want to make you aware of steps you can take to guard against fraud or identity theft. We recommend that you review your current and past credit and debit card account statements as soon as possible for discrepancies or unusual activity. You should remain vigilant and continue to monitor your statements for unusual activity going forward. If you see anything you do not understand or that looks suspicious, or if you suspect that any fraudulent transactions have taken place, you should call the bank that issued the credit or debit card immediately.

We are also initiating a password reset for the Website, which will require you to change your password. Please note, if you use the same password for limecrime.com on other online accounts, we recommend that you change your password for those accounts as well.

We also recommend that you carefully check your credit reports for accounts you did not open or for inquiries from creditors you did not initiate. Credit Freezes: You may have the right to put a credit freeze, also known as a security freeze, on your credit file, so that no new credit can be opened in your name without the use of a PIN number that is issued to you when you initiate a freeze. A credit freeze is designed to prevent potential credit grantors from accessing your credit report without your consent. If you place a credit freeze, potential creditors and other third parties will not be able to get access to your credit report unless you temporarily lift the freeze. Therefore, using a credit freeze may delay your ability to obtain credit. In addition, you may incur fees to place, lift and/or remove a credit freeze. Credit freeze laws vary from state to state. The cost of placing, temporarily lifting, and removing a credit freeze also varies by state, generally \$5 to \$20 per action at each credit reporting company. Unlike a fraud alert, you must separately place a credit freeze on your credit file at each credit reporting company. Since the instructions for how to establish a credit freeze differ from state to state, please contact the three major credit reporting companies as specified below to find out more information.

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

Dear Sirs or Madams:

I write on behalf of my client, Lime Crime, Inc. (operator of the limecrime.com website; the "Website") to inform you of a security incident involving personal information provided to Lime Crime that affected approximately 180 New Hampshire residents. Lime Crime is notifying these individuals and outlining some steps they may take to help protect themselves.

On February 11, 2015, after an extensive forensic investigation, Lime Crime learned that unauthorized individuals installed malicious software on the computer server hosting the Website. The company believes the malware could have compromised the personal information of customers that made credit or debit card purchases through the Website between October 4, 2014 and February 15, 2015, including name, address, Website username and password, payment card account number, card expiration date, and payment card security code. Customers that used PayPal to make purchases during that timeframe could have had their Website username and password compromised, but their credit and debit card information was not at risk.

Lime Crime takes the privacy of personal information seriously, and deeply regrets that this incident occurred. Lime Crime engaged a computer forensic investigator to perform an investigation and help address this incident. Lime Crime temporarily took the Website offline to prevent any further theft of personal information. In addition, the company replaced the ecommerce platform it previously used with a new platform, which has undergone a security vulnerability scan and code review and is further certified as PCI compliant.

Affected individuals are being notified via written letter, which includes an offer for one year of complimentary identity protection and fraud resolution services. These notifications will begin
