Dear Attorney General Formella:

We are writing on behalf of our client, Nice Pak Products, Inc. and Professional Disposables International, Inc. (collectively, "Nice Pak") to provide notice to your office concerning a cybersecurity incident.

On June 15, 2023, Nice Pak identified unusual activity on certain devices in their network. Nice Pak immediately implemented its response protocols, took measures to contain the activity, and launched an investigation. A cybersecurity firm also was engaged. Nice Pak notified law enforcement and is supporting its investigation.

The evidence showed that between May 28, 2023 and June 15, 2023, an unauthorized actor viewed and obtained files stored on certain servers in Nice Pak's network. Nice Pak conducted a careful review of the files and, on July 24, 2023, determined that one or more of the files contained the

, of 5 New Hampshire residents.

Today, August 14, 2023, Nice Pak is mailing notification letters via United States Postal Service First-Class mail to the involved New Hampshire residents in accordance with N.H. Rev. Stat. Ann. § 359-C:20. A copy of the notification letter template is enclosed. Nice Pak is offering the New Hampshire residents a complimentary, membership to credit monitoring and identity theft protection services. Nice Pak also has established a dedicated, toll-free call center that individuals can call to obtain more information regarding the incident.

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To help prevent something like this from happening again, we have taken and are taking steps to enhance our existing security measures.

If you believe you are the victim of identity theft or have reason to believe your personal information has been misused, you should immediately contact the Federal Trade Commission and/or the Attorney General's office in your state. You can obtain information from these sources about steps an individual can take to avoid identity theft as well as information about fraud alerts and security freezes. You should also contact your local law enforcement authorities and file a police report. Fraud Alerts and Credit or Security Freezes:

Fraud Alerts: There are two types of general fraud alerts you can place on your credit report to put your creditors on notice that you may be a victim of fraud—an initial alert and an extended alert. You may ask that an initial fraud alert be placed on your credit report if you suspect you have been, or are about to be, a victim of identity theft. An initial fraud alert stays on your credit report for one year. You may have an extended alert placed on your credit report if you have already been a victim of identity theft with the appropriate documentary proof. An extended fraud alert stays on your credit report for seven years.

To place a fraud alert on your credit reports, contact one of the nationwide credit bureaus. A fraud alert is free. The credit bureau you contact must tell the other two, and all three will place an alert on their versions of your report. For those in the military who want to protect their credit while deployed, an Active Duty Military Fraud Alert lasts for one year and can be renewed for the length of your deployment. The credit bureaus will also take you off their marketing lists for pre-screened credit card offers for two years, unless you ask them not to.

Credit or Security Freezes: You have the right to put a credit freeze, also known as a security freeze, on your credit file, free of charge, which makes it more difficult for identity thieves to open new accounts in your name. That's because most creditors need to see your credit report before they approve a new account. If they can't see your report, they may not extend the credit.

How do I place a freeze on my credit reports? There is no fee to place or lift a security freeze. Unlike a fraud alert, you must separately place a security freeze on your credit file at each credit reporting company. You'll need to supply your name, address, date of birth, Social Security number and other personal information. After receiving your freeze request, each credit bureau will provide you with a unique PIN (personal identification number) or password. Keep the PIN or password in a safe place. You will need it if you choose to lift the freeze.

How do I lift a freeze? A freeze remains in place until you ask the credit bureau to temporarily lift it or remove it altogether. If the request is made online or by phone, a credit bureau must lift a freeze within one hour. If the request is made by mail, then the bureau must lift the freeze no later than three business days after getting your request.

If you opt for a temporary lift because you are applying for credit or a job, and you can find out which credit bureau the business will contact for your file, you can save some time by lifting the freeze only at that particular credit bureau. Otherwise, you need to make the request with all three credit bureaus.

Protecting health insurance or medical information: It is always advisable to review any statements you may receive from your health insurer or healthcare providers. If you see charges for services that you did not receive, contact your insurer or provider immediately.
