Re: Incident Notification

Dear Attorney General Formella:

RCI, LLC ("RCI"), by and through its counsel, is providing notice to your office of a security incident involving New Hampshire residents. RCI is located at 6277 Sea Harbor, Orlando, Florida 32821.

RCI, like many other companies, uses a secure file transfer platform called MOVEit Transfer. Progress Software, which makes the MOVEit Transfer application, notified the public and users of a previously unknown vulnerability on May 31, 2023. Upon learning of the MOVEit Transfer vulnerability, RCI immediately followed the guidance from Progress Software for patching the MOVEit Transfer application and launched an investigation. RCI's investigation initially determined that there was no evidence of unauthorized access.

A third-party forensic firm that has assisted other companies with similar situations was then engaged. The evidence showed that a group known as CLOP had identified a vulnerability in MOVEit's Transfer software and used that vulnerability to access and obtain files from the device RCI used to operate the MOVEit Transfer application between May 31, 2023 and June 1, 2023. RCI conducted a careful review of the files viewed and taken by CLOP. On or about January 19, 2024, RCI identified a file containing the

, of 10 New Hampshire residents.

Today, March 1, 2024, RCI is mailing notification letters via First Class mail to the involved New Hampshire residents in accordance with N.H. Rev. Stat. Ann. § 359-C:20. A sample copy of the notification letter is enclosed. RCI is offering the residents a complimentary, membership to credit monitoring and identity theft protection services. RCI has a toll-free call center that individuals can call to obtain more information regarding the incident.

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In an effort to prevent something like this from happening again, RCI implemented additional access controls following the incident.

RCI, LLC understands the importance of protecting information. We are writing to inform you of an incident that involved some of your information. This notice explains what happened, what we have done in response, and what you can do.

What Happened?

We and many other companies use a secure file transfer platform called MOVEit Transfer. Progress Software, which makes the MOVEit Transfer application, notified the public and users of a previously unknown vulnerability on May 31, 2023. Upon learning of the MOVEit Transfer vulnerability, we immediately followed the guidance from Progress Software for patching the MOVEit Transfer application and launched an investigation. Our investigation initially determined that there was no evidence of unauthorized access.

A third-party forensic firm that has assisted other companies with similar situations was then engaged. The evidence showed that a group known as CLOP had identified a vulnerability in MOVEit's Transfer software and used that vulnerability to access and obtain files from the device we used to operate the MOVEit Transfer application between May 31, 2023, and June 1, 2023. We conducted a careful review of the files viewed and taken by CLOP. On or about January 19, 2024, we determined that files involved in the incident contained your government identification number.

What Information Was Involved?

We wanted to notify you of this incident and to assure you that we take it seriously. To help prevent something like this from happening again, we have implemented additional access controls following the incident.

What You Can Do.

We are paying for you to receive one year of access to Equifax CompleteTM Premier credit monitoring. This product helps detect possible misuse of your information and provides you with identity protection solutions focused on immediate identification and resolution of identity theft. Activating this product will not hurt your credit score. For more information on identity theft prevention and Equifax CompleteTM Premier, including instructions on how to activate your one year of access, as well as some additional steps you can take in response, please review the pages that follow this letter. Please note that you must complete the enrollment process yourself, as we are not permitted to enroll you in this product on your behalf.

If you believe you are the victim of identity theft or have reason to believe your personal information has been misused, you should immediately contact the Federal Trade Commission and/or the Attorney General's office in your state. You can obtain information from these sources about steps an individual can take to avoid identity theft as well as information about fraud alerts and security freezes. You should also contact your local law enforcement authorities and file a police report. Fraud Alerts and Credit or Security Freezes:

Fraud Alerts: There are two types of general fraud alerts you can place on your credit report to put your creditors on notice that you may be a victim of fraud—an initial alert and an extended alert. You may ask that an initial fraud alert be placed on your credit report if you suspect you have been, or are about to be, a victim of identity theft. An initial fraud alert stays on your credit report for one year. You may have an extended alert placed on your credit report if you have already been a victim of identity theft with the appropriate documentary proof. An extended fraud alert stays on your credit report for seven years.

To place a fraud alert on your credit reports, contact one of the nationwide credit bureaus. A fraud alert is free. The credit bureau you contact must tell the other two, and all three will place an alert on their versions of your report.

For those in the military who want to protect their credit while deployed, an Active Duty Military Fraud Alert lasts for one year and can be renewed for the length of your deployment. The credit bureaus will also take you off their marketing lists for pre-screened credit card offers for two years, unless you ask them not to.

Credit or Security Freezes: You have the right to put a credit freeze, also known as a security freeze, on your credit file, free of charge, which makes it more difficult for identity thieves to open new accounts in your name. That is because most creditors need to see your credit report before they approve a new account. If they cannot see your report, they may not extend the credit.

How do I place a freeze on my credit reports? There is no fee to place or lift a security freeze. Unlike a fraud alert, you must separately place a security freeze on your credit file at each credit reporting company. You will need to supply your name, address, date of birth, Social Security number and other personal information.

After receiving your freeze request, each credit bureau will provide you with a unique PIN (personal identification number) or password. Keep the PIN or password in a safe place. You will need it if you choose to lift the freeze.

How do I lift a freeze? A freeze remains in place until you ask the credit bureau to temporarily lift it or remove it altogether. If the request is made online or by phone, a credit bureau must lift a freeze within one hour. If the request is made by mail, then the bureau must lift the freeze no later than three business days after getting your request.

If you opt for a temporary lift because you are applying for credit or a job, and you can find out which credit bureau the business will contact for your file, you can save some time by lifting the freeze only at that particular credit bureau. Otherwise, you need to make the request with all three credit bureaus.

A Summary of Your Rights Under the Fair Credit Reporting Act: The federal Fair Credit Reporting Act (FCRA) promotes the accuracy, fairness, and privacy of information in the files of consumer reporting agencies. There are many types of consumer reporting agencies, including credit bureaus and specialty agencies (such as agencies that sell information about check writing histories, medical records, and rental history records). Your major rights under the FCRA are summarized below. - You must be told if information in your file has been used against you.
- You have the right to know what is in your file.
- You have the right to ask for a credit score.
- You have the right to dispute incomplete or inaccurate information.
- Consumer reporting agencies must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information.
- Consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information.
- Access to your file is limited.
- You must give your consent for reports to be provided to employers.
- You may limit "prescreened" offers of credit and insurance you get based on information in your credit report.
- You have a right to place a "security freeze" on your credit report, which will prohibit a consumer reporting agency from releasing information in your credit report without your express authorization.
- You may seek damages from violators.
- Identity theft victims and active duty military personnel have additional rights.
