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Re: Notice of Data Event

To Whom It May Concern:

We represent Scrubs and Beyond, LLC ("Scrubs") located at 12969 Manchester Rd, St. Louis, Missouri, 63131, and are writing to notify your office of an event that may affect the security of certain personal information relating to thirteen (13) New Hampshire residents. This notice will be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Scrubs does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of New Hampshire law, the applicability of the New Hampshire data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

#### Nature of the Data Event

On June 5, 2023, Scrubs discovered a blog post claiming that certain customer information affiliated with Scrubs was potentially copied from a limited portion of its network. Upon learning of the event, Scrubs launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the claimed occurrence. Through this investigation, Scrubs determined that that certain logs from this system were potentially viewed and/or copied from its environment between April 7, 2023, and April 12, 2023. On June 28, 2023, after determining the type of information and to whom the information related to, Scrubs confirmed the logs included information related to thirteen (13) New Hampshire residents. The personal information present in the relevant files may include

## **Notice to New Hampshire Residents**

On or about July 21, 2023, Scrubs provided written notice of this event to thirteen (13) New Hampshire residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

# Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, Scrubs promptly investigated and responded to the event, assessed the security of Scrubs systems, and identified potentially affected individuals. Further, Scrub notified federal law enforcement regarding the event.

Scrubs also implemented additional safeguards to its existing policies, processes, and security measures to mitigate the risk of reoccurrence. Scrubs is providing access to credit monitoring services for through Kroll to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this event, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, Scrubs is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their credit card company and/or bank, information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

Scrubs is providing written notice of this event to relevant state regulators, as necessary, and to the three major credit reporting agencies, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion.

Scrubs & Beyond is writing to provide you with notice of an event that may impact the confidentiality and security of your information. This letter contains information about the event, our response, and steps you can take to better protect your information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What Happened? In June 2023, Scrubs & Beyond identified potential unauthorized access into a limited portion of Scrubs & Beyond's network. In response, Scrubs & Beyond launched an investigation to determine the full nature and scope of the activity and confirm the security of its environment. Through this investigation, Scrubs & Beyond learned that certain logs were potentially copied from its environment between April 7, 2023, and April 12, 2023. Thus, we performed a detailed review of the information potentially affected by this event to determine what information was present in the logs and to whom it relates. You are receiving this letter because we determined on June 28, 2023, that your information was present.

What Information Was Involved? Based on our investigation to date, we determined that the personal information present may include

What We Are Doing. Scrubs & Beyond takes this event and the privacy of information in our care seriously and conducted a diligent investigation to confirm the full nature and scope of the event. In response to this event, we took prompt steps to ensure the security of our systems while conducting a comprehensive review of the information potentially affected by this event. We also reported this event to federal law enforcement and will be notifying applicable state regulators as required.

Further, as part of our ongoing commitment to the privacy and security of information in our care, we implemented additional safeguards to our existing policies, processes, and security measures. As an added precaution, we are providing you with access to identity monitoring services for at no cost to you. Information on these services and instructions on how to activate may be found in the enclosed *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Personal Information*.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitor your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. We also encourage you to review the enclosed *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Personal Information*.

#### **Activate Identity Monitoring**

To help relieve concerns and restore confidence following this incident, we have secured the services of Kroll to provide identity monitoring at no cost to you for one year. Kroll is a global leader in risk mitigation and response, and their team has extensive experience helping people who have sustained an unintentional exposure of confidential data. Your identity monitoring services include Credit Monitoring, Fraud Consultation, and Identity Theft Restoration.

#### **Monitor Your Accounts**

You should promptly report any activity indicative of identity theft or fraud to law enforcement and to your bank or credit card company as appropriate.

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order your free credit report, visit <a href="www.annualcreditreport.com">www.annualcreditreport.com</a> or call, toll-free,

You may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of your credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended "fraud alert" on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer's credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer's credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer's identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should you wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any one of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a "credit freeze" on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer's express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To request a security freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

- 1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
- 2. Social Security number;
- 3. Date of birth;
- 4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
- 5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
- 6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, etc.); and
- 7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
