Re: Notification Pursuant to N.H. Rev. Stat. § 359-C:20

Dear Attorney General Formella:

We are writing on behalf of our client, Charles Schwab & Co., Inc. ("Schwab"), to notify you of a security breach involving the personal information of 15 New Hampshire residents.

On December 16, 2021, Schwab discovered a potential issue regarding certain Schwab chat and email messages. Upon learning of the issue, Schwab immediately remediated the technical issue and initiated a privileged investigation to determine the scope of the incident and identify potentially affected consumers.

Through the investigation, on March 4, 2022, Schwab determined that between May 18, 2021 and December 16, 2021, certain chat and email messages sent through Schwab.com were inadvertently sent to external email systems. The information potentially affected may include customers' names and one or more of the following: Social Security number or tax identification number, driver's license or other state identification number, passport number, or username/password. To date, Schwab is not aware of any identity theft, fraud, or financial loss to consumers related to this incident.

Schwab mailed written notification to affected consumers on March 23, 2022, in accordance with law. A template copy of the consumer notification letter is attached at Exhibit A. Because Social Security numbers and tax identification numbers were not impacted for certain of the affected New Hampshire residents, a version of the attached template copy that does not reference Social Security numbers or tax identification numbers was mailed to those residents.

Out of an abundance of caution, Schwab will provide the affected New Hampshire residents with credit monitoring and identity protection services through IdentityForce, at no charge for a period of twenty-four (24) months, and also will staff a support line to answer any questions individuals may have about this incident or the services available to them. Schwab will

Notice of Data Breach

We are writing to let you know about a data event that may involve some of your personal information. Your trust is the foundation of our relationship, and we are committed to protecting the privacy of your information. As we outline below, we are taking steps to help you protect your data. We hope these actions can provide some peace of mind regarding your information's ongoing security.

What Happened?

On December 16, 2021, Schwab discovered a potential issue regarding certain chat and email messages and immediately began an investigation. As a result of the investigation, we recently determined that between May 18, 2021, and December 16, 2021, certain chat and email messages sent through Schwab.com were inadvertently sent to external email systems.

What Information Was Involved?

The information potentially affected may include your name and one or more of the following: Social Security number or tax identification number, driver's license or other state identification number, passport number, or username/password. To be clear, we have no evidence of any misuse of your information or unauthorized access to your Schwab account.

What We Are Doing.

Upon learning of this event, we immediately remediated the issue and worked to identify the information involved and who may be affected.

To help you maintain confidence in the ongoing privacy of your information, we have arranged for you to be able to enroll in credit monitoring and identity protection services from IdentityForce® for two years at no cost to you. To enroll, please follow the instructions provided at the end of this letter. Please note that the deadline to enroll is June 8, 2022.

Schwab will continue to apply its multiple layers of security protections, including the 24/7 monitoring of our systems and client accounts for any signs of unusual activity.

What You Can Do.

We recommend you review the enclosed "Other Important Information" document for further steps you can take to help protect your information. Additionally, Schwab offers the ability to set up security alerts and to enroll in advanced authentication that makes your Schwab sign-in more secure with two-step verification. Finally, we encourage you, as always, to remain vigilant to protect against potential fraud and/or identity theft by reviewing your financial account statements and monitoring your free credit reports. Fraud Alert. You have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on your file at no cost by contacting any of the four nationwide credit-reporting-agencies identified below. An initial fraud alert is a one-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert displayed on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. For that reason, placing a fraud alert can protect you, but also may delay you when you seek to obtain credit. If you are a victim of identity theft and have filed an identity theft report with law enforcement, you may want to consider placing an extended fraud alert, which lasts for seven years, on your credit file.

Security Freeze. You have the right to place, lift, or remove a “security freeze” on your credit report, free of charge. A security freeze prohibits a credit-reporting agency from releasing any information from a consumer’s credit report without written authorization. However, please be aware that placing a security freeze on your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prevent the timely approval of any requests you make for new loans, credit mortgages, employment, housing or other services. Under federal law, you cannot be charged to place, lift, or remove a security freeze. You must place your request for a freeze separately with each of the consumer reporting agencies. To place a security freeze on your credit report, you may do so by contacting each of the consumer reporting agencies through the contact information below:

In order to request a security freeze, you will need to provide some or all of the following information to the credit-reporting agency, depending on whether you do so online, by phone, or by mail (note that if you are requesting a security freeze for your spouse, this information must be provided for him/her as well): (1) full name, with middle initial and any suffixes; (2) Social Security number; (3) date of birth; (4) current address and any previous addresses for the past five years; and (5) any applicable incident report or complaint with a law enforcement agency or the Registry of Motor Vehicles. The request must also include a copy of a government-issued identification card and a copy of a recent utility bill or bank or insurance statement. It is essential that each copy be legible and display your name, current mailing address, and the date of issue. If you are a victim of identity theft, include a copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning the identity theft.

The credit-reporting agencies have one business day after receiving your request by toll-free telephone or secure electronic means, or up to three business days after receiving your request by mail, to place a security freeze on your credit report. The credit bureaus must also send written confirmation to you within five business days and may provide you with a unique personal identification number (PIN) or password (or both) that can be used by you to authorize the removal or lifting of the security freeze. It is important to maintain this PIN/password in a secure place, as you will need it to lift or remove the security freeze.

To lift the security freeze in order to allow a specific entity or individual access to your credit report, or to lift a security freeze for a specified period of time, you must submit a request through a toll-free telephone number; by a secure electronic means maintained by a credit-reporting agency; or by sending a written request via regular, certified, or overnight mail to the credit-reporting agencies and include proper identification (name, address, and Social Security number) and the PIN or password provided to you when you placed the security freeze, as well as the identity of those entities or individuals you would like to receive your credit report or the specific period of time you want the credit report available. The credit-reporting agencies have one business day after receiving your request by toll-free telephone or secure electronic means, or three business days after receiving your request by mail, to lift the security freeze for those identified entities or for the specified period of time.

To remove the security freeze, you must submit a request through a toll-free telephone number; by a secure electronic means maintained by a credit-reporting agency; or by sending a written request via regular, certified, or overnight mail to each of the credit bureaus and include proper identification (name, address, and Social Security number) and the PIN or password provided to you when you placed the security freeze. The credit bureaus have one business day after receiving your request by toll-free telephone or secure electronic means, or three business days after receiving your request by mail, to remove the security freeze.

Federal Trade Commission and State Attorneys General Offices. If you believe you have been the victim of identity theft or have reason to believe your personal information has been misused, you should immediately report that to the FTC, your local law enforcement agency, and/or your state attorney general. You may also contact these agencies for information on how to prevent or avoid identity theft and to obtain additional information about fraud alerts and security freezes. This notification was not delayed as a result of a law enforcement investigation.
