Re: Notice of Data Event

Dear Sir or Madam:

We represent Dillon Precision Products, Inc. ("Dillon Precision") located at 8009 E. Dillons Way Scottsdale, AZ 85260, and are writing to notify your office of a data event that may affect certain personal information relating to four (4) New Hampshire residents. The investigation into this matter is ongoing, and this notice will be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Dillon Precision does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of New Hampshire law, the applicability of the New Hampshire data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On June 13, 2022, Dillon Precision identified suspicious system activity and began an investigation to determine its nature and scope. Although the investigation is ongoing, it was determined that certain files contained within Dillon Precision systems may have been subject to unauthorized access between June 10, 2022 and June 13, 2022. As a result, Dillon Precision undertook a comprehensive analysis in order to identify what information was potentially contained within the impacted files, and to whom that information belongs.

On or about June 24, 2022, Dillon Precision determined that the involved systems may have contained information relating to New Hampshire residents including name, Social Security Number, and driver's license number.

Notice to New Hampshire Residents

Although Dillon Precision's investigation is ongoing, on July 18, 2022, Dillon Precision began providing written notice of the event to potentially affected individuals, which includes four (4) New Hampshire residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the anomalous system activity, Dillon Precision initiated an investigation to determine the full nature and scope of the event. Dillon Precision also notified law enforcement, is reviewing existing policies and procedures, and implementing additional safeguards to further secure the information in its systems as appropriate. Dillon Precision is providing access to credit monitoring services for twelve (12) months, through Experian, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by the event, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, Dillon Precision is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud. Dillon Precision is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state attorney general, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

Dillon Precision is providing written notice of this incident to relevant state regulatory authorities, and notice to the three major credit reporting agencies, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion.

Dillon Precision Products, Inc. ("Dillon") is writing to notify you of an incident that may affect some of your personal information. We take this incident seriously, and write to provide you with information about the incident, what we are doing in response, and the resources that we are making available to you to protect your information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What Happened? On June 13, 2022, Dillon identified suspicious system activity. Upon discovering this activity, we immediately began an investigation with the assistance of third-party specialists to determine its nature and scope. Through the investigation, it was determined that certain files contained within Dillon systems may have been subject to unauthorized access between June 10, 2022 and June 13, 2022. 2022. As a result, Dillon undertook a comprehensive analysis in order to identify what information was potentially contained within the impacted files, and to whom that information belongs.

What Information Was Involved? While our investigation remains ongoing, on or about June 24, 2022, our review has determined that the impacted files included information pertaining to certain individuals, including you. We are notifying you because our investigation determined that your name, Social Security number, and driver's license number may have been present in the impacted files.

What We Are Doing. We take this incident and the security of information within our care very seriously. Upon discovery of this incident, we began an in-depth investigation with the assistance of third-party forensic specialists to determine its full nature and scope. As part of our ongoing commitment to the privacy of information in our care, we are reviewing our existing policies and procedures and implementing additional safeguards to further secure the information in our systems as appropriate. We have also notified federal law enforcement, as well as state regulatory authorities, as required by law.

We are also notifying potentially affected individuals, including you, so that you may take further steps to protect your information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so. As an added precaution, we arranged to have Experian provide credit monitoring services for [Extra2] at no cost to you. Instructions for enrolling in these services are included with this letter.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. Please also review the information contained in the enclosed Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Information. You may also enroll in the complimentary identity credit monitoring services we are making available to you. Enrollment instructions are attached to this letter.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order your free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. You may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of your credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended "fraud alert" on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer's credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer's credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer's identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should you wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any one of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a "credit freeze" on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer's express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To request a credit freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

- 1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
- 2. Social Security number;
- 3. Date of birth;
- 4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
- 5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
- 6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, etc.); and
- 7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
