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Re: Legal Notice of Information Security Incident

Dear Sirs or Madams:

Pursuant New Hampshire Revised Statute §359-C:20, we write on behalf of our client, Jounce Therapeutics, Inc. ("Jounce"), to inform you of a security incident that may have affected the personal information of approximately four New Hampshire residents. At this time, Jounce has no evidence that the potentially affected New Hampshire residents' information has been misused.

On February 22, 2021, Jounce discovered an employee's Office 365 mailbox may have been compromised. Jounce immediately began an investigation and engaged a cybersecurity and forensic firm to determine whether the company had experienced a security incident, and if so, how the security incident had occurred and the scope of such incident. The investigation confirmed that a single employee email account had been accessed by an unauthorized actor. On March 15, 2021, Jounce learned that certain personal information, as defined under New Hampshire Revised Statute §359-C:19(IV)(a), was contained in the email account. While the incident has been remediated and Jounce has no evidence that personal information was targeted or misused, Jounce is notifying potentially affected individuals out of an abundance of caution.

Jounce's investigation revealed that the following types of New Hampshire resident's personal information may have been accessed by the unauthorized actor: name, address, phone number, Social Security number, financial account number or routing number, health plan policy number, and date of birth.

Because Jounce takes the privacy of personal information very seriously, Jounce has engaged Experian to provide this individual with a complimentary two year membership of Experian's® IdentityWorksSM. Experian's services include but are not limited to, an Experian credit report upon signup, triple bureau credit monitoring, identity restoration, and up to \$1 million in identity theft insurance.

In addition to providing identity protection services, Jounce continues to review its security measures, internal controls, and safeguards and continues to make changes to help prevent a

similar incident from occurring in the future. These changes include disabling the ability to access email through legacy log in protocols and requiring all employees to use multi-factor authentication.

Potentially affected individuals are being notified via a mailed letter on April 2, 2021. A copy of the notification letter, which excludes any identifying information, is included for your reference.

Re: Notification of Data Security Incident

We are writing to inform you about a recent data security incident in which some of your personal information was involved. We take the protection and proper use of your information very seriously. For this reason, we are contacting you directly to explain the circumstances of the incident and steps you can take to protect yourself.

What Happened

We recently became aware of a potential security incident affecting an employee's Office 365 mailbox. We immediately contained the incident, began an investigation and engaged a leading cybersecurity and forensic firm to assist in determining the full nature and scope of the potential incident.

As a result of our investigation, on March 15, 2021, we learned that certain personal information was contained in the compromised email account. Certain of this information may have been related to a historic consulting relationship with your current or former employer. At this time, we have no evidence that your personal information was targeted or misused. Nonetheless, we wanted to alert you and provide you with protective measures you can take. We encourage you to take the measures outlined in this letter to help protect your information.

What Information Was Involved

The data in the compromised mailbox may have included your name, email address, address, telephone number, Social Security number, Driver's License number, financial account number, credit card number, date of birth, tax information and health plan policy number.

What are We Doing

We continue to implement additional security measures, internal controls, and safeguards, as well as continue to make changes to existing policies and procedures designed to prevent a similar occurrence from happening again. In addition, although we are not aware of any instances of fraud or identity theft, we are offering a complimentary two-year membership of Experian's® IdentityWorksSM.

To activate your membership and start monitoring your personal information please follow the steps below:

- Ensure that you **enroll by:** June 30, 2021. (Your code will not work after this date.)

Free Credit Report. We remind you to be vigilant for incidents of fraud or identity theft by reviewing your account statements and free credit reports for any unauthorized activity. You may obtain a copy of your credit report, free of charge, once every 12 months from each of the three nationwide credit reporting companies. To order your annual free credit report, please visit annualcreditreport.com or call toll free at 877-322-8228. You can also order your annual free credit report by mailing a completed Annual Credit Report Request Form (available from the U.S. Federal Trade Commission's (FTC) website at consumer.ftc.gov) to: Annual Credit Report Request Service, P.O. Box 105281, Atlanta, GA 30348-5281.

For Maryland, Massachusetts, and New Jersey residents:

You may obtain one or more (depending on the state) additional copies of your credit report, free of charge. You must contact each of the credit reporting agencies directly to obtain such additional report(s).

Security Freeze. Security freezes, also known as credit freezes, restrict access to your credit file, making it harder for identity thieves to open new accounts in your name. You can freeze and unfreeze your credit file for free. You also can get a free freeze for your children who are under 16. And if you are someone's guardian, conservator or have a valid power of attorney, you can get a free freeze for that person, too.

How will these freezes work? Contact all three of the nationwide credit reporting agencies Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. If you request a freeze online or by phone, the agency must place the freeze within one business day. If you request a lift of the freeze, the agency must lift it within one hour. If you make your request by mail, the agency must place or lift the freeze within three business days after it gets your request. You also can lift the freeze temporarily without a fee.

Don't confuse freezes with locks. They work in a similar way, but locks may have monthly fees. If you want a free freeze guaranteed by federal law, then opt for a freeze, not a lock.

The following information must be included when requesting a security freeze (note that if you are requesting a credit report for your spouse, this information must be provided for him/her as well): (1) full name, with middle initial and any suffixes; (2) Social Security number; (3) date of birth; (4) current address and any previous addresses for the past five years; and (5) any applicable incident report or complaint with a law enforcement agency or the Registry of Motor Vehicles. The request must also include a copy of a government-issued identification card and a copy of a recent utility bill or bank or insurance statement. It is essential that each copy be legible and display your name, current mailing address and date of issue.

For Illinois residents: You may obtain information from the credit reporting agencies and the FTC about security freezes.

Fraud Alerts. A fraud alert tells businesses that check your credit that they should check with you before opening a new account. As of Sept.18, 2018, when you place a fraud alert, it will last one year, instead of 90 days. Fraud alerts will still be free and identity theft victims can still get an extended fraud alert for seven years.

For Illinois residents: You may obtain additional information from the credit reporting agencies and the FTC about fraud alerts.

Obtaining a police report.

You have the right to obtain any police report filed in the United States in regard to this incident. If you are the victim of fraud or identity theft, you also have the right to file a police report.

For Massachusetts residents: You have the right to obtain a police report if you are a victim of identity theft. You also have a right to file a police report and obtain a copy of it.

For Oregon residents: You are advised to report any suspected identity theft to law enforcement, the Federal Trade Commission, and the Oregon Attorney General.

For Rhode Island residents: You have the right to file or obtain a police report regarding this incident.
