Re: *Security Incident Notification*

Dear Sir or Madame,

I write on behalf of Stanford University's (Stanford) Department of Public Safety (DPS), the on-campus law enforcement resource for Stanford, with respect to a data security event involving certain personal information of New Hampshire residents. By providing this notice, Stanford does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of New Hampshire law or personal jurisdiction.

On September 27, 2023, Stanford's DPS discovered that it was the victim of a ransomware attack. Upon discovering the attack, Stanford notified federal and local law enforcement, engaged legal counsel, and began investigating the incident with the assistance of CrowdStrike, a respected forensic investigator. Stanford did not engage with the threat actor or pay any ransom. Stanford's investigation determined that an unauthorized individual(s) gained access to the DPS network between May 12, 2023, and September 28, 2023. Given that at least some of the impacted data was law-enforcement-related, it took Stanford several weeks to discuss with California law enforcement officials the safeguards that would be required before Stanford could have non-law enforcement personnel review the impacted data set. Once those discussions concluded, Stanford conducted a manual review of the impacted data set, a substantial portion of which was non-structured data. Once that review was complete, Stanford then worked to obtain address information for potentially impacted persons from its different systems. Ultimately, this process concluded in February 2024.

Based on Stanford's investigation, it believes that approximately nine (9) New Hampshire residents may have been affected by this incident. The affected information varied by individual, but for New Hampshire residents may have included their

While the investigation was ongoing, on October 27, 2023, Stanford posted an update regarding this incident to its website. Individual notification letters will be sent to potentially impacted New Hampshire residents on March 11, 2024, via regular U.S. mail. Copies of the template notification letters are enclosed. In addition, Stanford is offering _____ of CyberScan and dark web monitoring to all impacted persons. Individuals whose Social Security Number, credit card number, username and password, government ID number, or passport number may have been affected are also being offered, free of charge, _____ of credit monitoring services from TransUnion.

Stanford began restoring the DPS systems from secure backups in October 2023. To date, Stanford has not detected any additional indicators of compromise as the DPS data and network were restored. Stanford is also taking steps to enhance the network security safeguards at DPS.

We write to inform you about a data security incident at Stanford University's Department of Public Safety ("Stanford DPS") that may have impacted your personal information.

WHAT HAPPENED?

On September 27, 2023, Stanford DPS discovered that it was the victim of a ransomware attack. Upon discovering the attack, Stanford DPS notified federal and local law enforcement and began investigating the incident with the assistance of a respected forensic investigator. Our investigation determined that an unauthorized individual(s) gained access to the Stanford DPS network between May 12, 2023 and September 27, 2023. The nature and scope of the incident required time to analyze, and it was ultimately determined that your information may have been impacted.

WHAT INFORMATION WAS INVOLVED?

The personal information that may have been affected varied from person-to-person. Information about you included
DPS may have
collected in its operations. At this time, there is no evidence that your information has been misused.

WHAT WE ARE DOING

We take safeguarding your information seriously. Upon discovering the incident, we notified federal and local law enforcement and worked with external cybersecurity experts to terminate the unauthorized access. Stanford DPS is also further enhancing its security safeguards.

In addition, we are offering identity theft protection services through IDX, a ZeroFox company. IDX identity protection services include: of credit and CyberScan monitoring, a \$1,000,000 insurance reimbursement policy, and fully managed id theft recovery services. With this protection, IDX will help you resolve issues if your identity is compromised.

GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT IDENTITY THEFT PROTECTION

You should remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing credit card account statements and monitoring your credit report for unauthorized activity.

Credit Reports. Under federal law, you are entitled to one free copy of your credit report every 12 months from each of the three nationwide credit reporting agencies. You may obtain a free copy of your credit report by going to www.AnnualCreditReport.com or by calling (877) 322-8228. You also may complete the Annual Credit Report Request Form available from the FTC at www.consumer.ftc.gov/articles/pdf-0093-annual-report-request-form.pdf, and mail it to Annual Credit Report Request Service, P.O. Fraud Alert. You may place a fraud alert in your file by calling one of the three nationwide credit reporting agencies above. A fraud alert tells creditors to follow certain procedures, including contacting you before they open any new accounts or change your existing accounts. For that reason, placing a fraud alert can protect you, but also may delay you when you seek to obtain credit.

Place a Security Freeze on your Credit Report. You also have the right to place a security freeze on your credit report by contacting any of the credit bureaus listed above. A security freeze is intended to prevent credit, loans and services from being approved in your name without your consent. To place a security freeze on your credit report, you may be able to use an online process, an automated telephone line or a written request. The following information must be included when requesting a security freeze (note that if you are requesting a credit report for your spouse, this information must be provided for him/her as well): (1) full name, with middle initial and any suffixes; (2) Social Security number; (3) date of birth; (4) current address and any previous addresses for the past five years; and (5) any applicable incident report or complaint with a law enforcement agency or the Registry of Motor Vehicles. The request must also include a copy of a government-issued identification card and a copy of a recent utility bill or bank or insurance statement. You can place a freeze and lift a security freeze on your credit report free of charge.
